Who are we?

- Part of BU School of Law, partnership with MIT
- Two different clinics:
 - Startup Law Clinic
 - Technology Law Clinic

How are we different than hiring a lawyer?

- Students manage client relationship and draft documents
 - Always reviewed by an attorney
- Slower
 - Multi-step review process
- Free!

Startup Law Clinic: What kind of work do we handle?

For-Profit Entity Formation

- Choice between LLC and corporation
- Decision on jurisdiction
 - Delaware
 - Massachusetts
- Formation of company and drafting post-formation documents
- Issuance of equity (using vesting schedules, as requested)
- Guidance on filing necessary tax forms
- Early-stage financing

Nonprofit Formation

- Formation of company (Massachusetts)
- Necessary post-formation documents (bylaws, conflicts of interest policy, etc.)
- Assistance with 1023-EZ tax exempt status application
- Guidance and assistance with solicitation registration

Intellectual Property

- Guidance on IP strategy
- Trademark
 - Analysis of names and logos
 - Drafting application for federal trademark registration
- Copyright
 - Copyright registration
- Trade secrets
 - IP assignments
 - NDAs

Contracts

- Negotiation and drafting
- Customer contracts
 - Terms of service
 - Privacy policy
- License agreements
- IP and confidentiality agreements
 - NDAs
 - IP assignments (including for class projects)
- Other contracts

Team expansion

- Guidance on differences between employees, independent contractors, interns and volunteers
- Agreements for workers, particularly independent contractor agreements

Technology Law Clinic: What kind of work do we handle?

Intellectual Property

- "Permissionless" uses of brands and content
- Use of content in machine learning and other new/emergent systems
- Open source software compliance
- Response to legal threats over use of another's content or brands

Data Privacy

- Communications and information privacy for researchers and ventures
- Consumer privacy issues
 - Tracking users online or offline
 - Selling security / privacy tools to the public
- Sectoral data privacy compliance
 - Health HIPAA, BIPA, state-level regimes
 - Education/research FERPA, IRB Common Rule
 - Children's data COPPA
 - Finance GLBA, BSA
- Compliance with non-US and Mass. regimes
 - GDPR
 - CCPA

Cybersecurity / Computer Access

- "Unauthorized access" to computers
 - Computer Fraud and Abuse Act
 - ECPA Wiretap Act, Stored Communications Act
- Encryption / decryption concerns
 - DMCA "Anticircumvention" laws
 - Preliminary assessments under export control
- Data security obligations
 - Mass. data security statute M.G.L. Chapter 93H

Media Law

- Free speech issues
- Review of sensitive/controversial research
 - Coordinated vulnerability disclosures
- Media privacy / newsgathering torts
- FOIA and state public records laws
- Defamation defense

Why kinds of work can't we handle?

- Subject-matter
 - Patent
 - Immigration
 - Clinic can provide free consultations to local attorneys in the space
- Jurisdiction
 - Work is limited to Massachusetts and Delaware (with some exceptions)
- Criminal (beyond counseling in laws like CFAA and Wiretap Act)

When is it time to contact us?

- For ventures: moving past "idea" stage of venture and have capital to pay registration fees
- For researchers: you sense your project may have a legal dimension or issue
- For everyone: you receive a legal threat or demand related to your innovative work
- Examples:
 - Ready to form a company
 - Advice on protecting intellectual property
 - Assistance with drafting contracts

When do I need to form a company?

- Taking on liabilities
 - Entering into contracts
 - Users on websites/apps
- Need company bank account

When do I need to get a trademark?

- When you've confirmed the name/logo <u>and</u> have formed a company
- Can file "intent-to-use" application before using mark in commerce

What if I'm on a visa?

- If you are forming a company that involves "work" by someone on a visa, that person should speak to immigration attorney
- Clinic may be able to provide general information, but we recommend speaking to an immigration attorney and can provide referrals

When should a researcher contact the TLC?

- Web scraping! Systematic gathering of data off websites using scraping or unanticipated use of APIs
- Collecting, working with, or planning to publish sensitive datasets
- Security research, with or without a bug bounty program
- Use of third-party content in public-facing content
- Using the law as a research tool FOIA and public records

When should I get a data privacy consultation?

- If you plan to handle the following types of content:
 - Health data, especially from doctors, hospitals, or health insurance companies
 - Data that comes directly from a University
 - Personal or corporate financial information
 - Data pertaining to children (<13 years)
- You plan to collect sensitive consumer data
 - Facial recognition technology
 - Location tracking (GPS, IP geofencing, or otherwise)
 - Interception of Wi-Fi or Bluetooth beacons
 - Unusual Internet or API content (device fingerprinting, browser history, smartphone sensor data)

What does it cost?

- Our services are free
- You pay registration and filing costs

What are your responsibilities?

- Respond and communicate
 - Respond in a timely manner, otherwise we will not be able to complete work efficiently
 - Let us know if you need extra time or decide to abandon the venture
- Patience
 - Again, we are slower than paid attorneys
 - Understand this is a learning opportunity for our students
- Review
 - Collaborative process
 - Review all documents you send us and ask questions
